Something hobbyists can hold in their hands and peruse for years to come!

Who am I? My name is Morgen Kilbourn and I'm a sculptor and sometimes painter in the hobby.

WHY am I making this? Because for years I've wanted to see printed media come back into the hobby. I've seen old issues treasured and kept for years, I've witnessed hobbyists delighted to see ads from themselves and friends in 10 and 15 year old issues of formerly printed hobby magazines that have sadly gone away. I truly feel there is a place still though even in this modern era of electronic media for an annual directory, even though it's a financially risky venture for me!

RESIN MODEL HORSES: The Artist's Vision

Most people have heard of Breyer plastic model horses, from visits to tack, hobby, or toy stores. When collectors go to Breyerfest, or when they attend their first model horse show, they are surprised to see so many different horse sculptures, including brand new creations that they have never seen before! These "Resins" are not toys. They are limited edition, hand painted, very detailed works of art.

Resin model horses are relatively new. While plastic model horses have been made since the 1950's and ceramic horses have been available for generations, new methods and materials have only recently made it possible for every artist to make detailed copies of their sculptures available to collectors. The first resins were sold to the public in the 1980's, but resins really became popular starting in the 1990's.

What is Resin?

Resin is a plastic type material. It is mixed as a liquid, poured into a mold, and it captures every detail of the original sculpture. Resin is not baked in a kiln like ceramics. It is not a solid that is melted with heat, and then pushed into a steel mold, like plastic. Resin is liquid that is in two parts. When the two parts are mixed together, a chemical reaction happens, and the liquid hardens and turns into a solid.

Why Resin?

China or porcelain horses are beautiful, but they are fragile. Resins are more durable, especially for Performance displays where tack and riders are added. Bronze is extremely strong, but too heavy to drag to shows, and very expensive to cast. Mass-produced plastic horses are lightweight and durable, but high production costs make it impossible for one artist to create a small number of plastic horses.

Resin is perfect for smaller numbers of limited edition horses. Resin is strong and durable. It can be painted and customized. If it breaks, it can be fixed.

How is a Resin made?

First, the artist makes a horse sculpture out of clay. Then a mold is made from this original. The mold for a resin is made out of a flexible material called silicone. The rubbery mold makes it possible for every detail to be captured, even in areas like under the jaw and inside the mouth, which are especially hard to capture detail in plastic or ceramic. Wires can be added to the legs or tail of a resin horse during molding, which can give these skinny areas extra strength. This can make a resin a great choice for the stressful handling when traveling show to show, and being packed or shipped frequently.

Who creates Resin horses?

Many artists who sculpt for companies like Breyer or Stone also create limited editions in resin. Companies like Breyer can only release a few new horses each year, because the steel molds for plastics are very expensive.

Sculpting a horse for Breyer may only take an artist two or three months, which means the rest of the year they are free to create other new sculptures. Popular commercial artists like Kathleen Moody, Sue Sifton, Kitty Cantrell and others have created many horses that are not sold by Breyer or Stone. There are more horse sculptures in resin than can ever be produced by any toy company.

Other artists choose only to release horses this way. They choose resin so they can have complete artistic control over their product. Artists can choose to sculpt what breeds or poses they want, and they can work without the demands or deadlines of having a company telling them what to create, or when they must have it finished. This allows artists to slow down and take as much time as they need to finish all the details.



Why are Resins so expensive?

Resins mass produced overseas in countries like China can be made somewhat affordably, although they still may be more expensive than a plastic horse. However, almost all resins sold by artists are made in the U.S. To produce a resin edition of 50 horses, an artist must invest about \$5000 out of their own pocket, up front, to have the models created. The artist must do all the work themselves that a big company would normally cover, like advertising, taking orders, packing and shipping. Plus, the limited edition must generate enough income to support the artist so they can make even more lovely horse sculptures in the future.

An unpainted traditional scale resin horse is usually priced from \$200 to \$400 unpainted. However, only a small number of each sculpture are created, generally 50 to 200 pieces - ever! A resin horse may seem expensive, but the same horse in bronze would cost thousands. Resin and bronze have the same exact level of detail. When you buy a resin, it is like buying a rare bronze limited edition art piece. The only difference is the resin is lighter and easier to ship, and much easier to paint and customize, which makes them perfect for model horse showing.

Why are Resins sold unpainted?

Most resins are sold "blank" or unpainted. This is because each resin is designed to be a one of a kind, unique creation. In model horse shows, they have their own division to show in. A good paint job can make one resin look more impressive than another.

You can either hire an artist to create your own personalized dream horse, or pick up a paintbrush and try it yourself! Don't be afraid to give it a try, paint can safely be removed from a resin many times over if you don't like the final result.

Many collectors find resins a way to get a more personalized model horse. They find painting resins or commissioning a custom painted resin is a much different experience than taking a mass-produced plastic horse out of a box and putting it on a table. While there may be another of the same resin sculpture at the same show, the unique paint jobs make sure you won't be competing against 10 of the exact same plastic horse with the exact same color and markings.

Collecting Resin Models

A huge selection of models are available to collectors, but each must be purchased from either the artist directly, or second hand on web sites like "Model Horse Sales Pages". Painted resins are one of a kind, and most collectors consider each new addition carefully. Just like limited edition prints or bronzes, some of them appreciate and go up in value. Some resins sell out fast, and then reach two to three times the original purchase price on the secondary market. Others may decrease slightly in value over the years.

However, just like any fine art purchase, a collector should never count on making money off a sculpture or buy just for resale alone. The most important thing to remember about resins is to buy what you like. You may choose to collect sculptures of your favorite breed, such as Quarter Horses or Arabians. Or you might like to collect sculptures by artists whose work you enjoy.

Sometimes resins can give a preview of what future artists may eventually be seen in stores. Artists such as Karen Gerhardt, who sculpted the Cleveland Bay model for Breyer, and Brigette Eberl, who has sculpted for both Breyer and Stone companies,

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are just two of the artists who began their career by producing resins. Some artists that appear "new" to collectors of plastic horses are familiar



familiar names to resin collectors.

While shopping online or in room sales at Breyerfest,

keep your eyes open for these "other" model horses. If you see one you like, be sure to ask the name of the edition and the artist. You may visit the artist's web site later to see how many were made, or if any more are available. Because the number of these models are so limited, popular ones sell out fast! You'll often need to stay in contact with artists via their web sites or announcement lists to find out what they are working on currently, and when it will be available, if you don't want to miss out. Popular resins usually sell out in only a few month's time.

Resin models offer a whole new dimension and hundreds of fresh choices for anyone who loves model horse collecting! Be sure to check out some of the artist web sites mentioned in this magazine to find out more.
